# Qualitative Data Workshop, Bremen, April 23 2009 Summary from afternoon workshop sessions (Group 1)

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### **Q1:** Barriers and enablers

Barriers:	Enablers:
No culture of data sharing.	A culture is developing little by little.
A methodological obstacle is often put forward – to understand and be able to analyse data you have to be part of the data gathering (be the interviewer).	However often the interviews are carried out by other people than the researcher herself.

# **Q2: Effectiveness of existing models**

Although working with qualitative data for 10 years it's still a struggle. Researchers are contacted several times a year with information letters. It's still hard to reach researcher.

A good idea is to provide taxonomies e.g. smoking habits for relevant data sets. It should be possible to perform both thematic and free text searches in the data. Possibility for storing the analysis procedures (codes) employed.

#### Q3: Range of archives vs. centralised archive

A centralised archive is regarded the best solution.

Similar problems exist for QN and QL archives, benefits from being together.

More and more studies use mixed methods. One centralised archive will facilitate the use of mixed methods.

#### **Q4: Infrastructure**

Much of the technical infrastructure may be shared.

Resources for data analysis are popular. Training material enforce re-use of data. A very good idea.

## **Q5: Getting started**

It might take a long time as for e.g. FSD.
